THE WOMEN'S LAND ARMY 'The Land Girls'

- Originally founded in World War 1
- Main role was to assist with food production through farming
- Young women from all over the country stepped forward to be sent to farms as extra workers and were known as the Land Girls
- Throughout WW2 over 200,000 women were employed by the WLA, with over 80,000 at the peak.
- For many living in rural areas, it was a shock to see young women walking around with trousered legs, and they were not always treated kindly by farmers and local residents, who also doubted their ability to work as hard as the men. But the Land Army were there to prove them wrong!
- Land Girls were sent to work in a shirt and trousered legs, usually wearing a jumper and either jodhpurs or dungarees. They also had a green beret

TRIVIA!

In MED Theatre's production of 'Devon's War Girls,' Molly is a Land Girl from London. She arrives at the farmhouse where she would be working to find there is no electricity, no flushing toilet and no hot water. This was not unusual in rural areas and lots of Land Girls would have experienced this!



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THE WOMEN'S TIMBER CORPS 'The Lumber Jills'

- Founded during WWII in 1942
- The country was in need of extra timber supplies and so the Women's Timber Corps was launched and women were invited to sign up for work in forestry
- They felled trees, measured trees for logging, loaded trucks and transferred the logs to the sawmills. Many of
- Some of them worked inside the sawmills and many women who had proven their ability to work hard were given more responsibility
- There were Lumber Jills working on forestry sites in various locations in Devon, including near Honiton and in Haldon Forest.

TRIVIA!

'Devon's War Girls' features a scene in which three Land Girls ride on one bike to get to a dance. This is actually a true story but the women were in fact Lumber Jills!

Many Lumber Jills were supplied with a bike so that they could ride from their lodgings to the forest they were working in each day, while others would be collected in a large truck and taken to the site.
